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The pull that is a blessing, and the pull that destroys

ERY powerful is the influence that people exert on one another. Some people possess a power of attraction, while others are cursed with a power of repulsion. Moreover, this applies in every domain. Certain elements are drawn together, while others fly apart. As a proverb says: "Birds of a feather flock together." There are things that mix and bind together, and others that avoid and combat one another. For another thing, it is not an axiom that every power that pulls invariably leads to happiness and blessing.

For instance, on Earth are exerted two influences which pull in diametrically opposite directions: that of the Kingdom of God, and that of Satan, the Adversary. The pull of the Kingdom of God leads all who submit to its laws to joy, life and felicity; whereas that of the Adversary's kingdom of lawlessness, leads the people who yield to it to disappointment and woe. All people are, at present, in the grip of that devilish pull, and that is why their lives are strewn with pain and troubles, and why their end is death, utter destruction.

The pull of the Kingdom of God, at present, has little effect on people because they have not been educated at a school that would attune them to that influence of blessing, but to one that creates affinities with the influence of "the god of this world". The basis of the Kingdom of God, is entirely different from that of the Adversary's realm where there flourishes the poisonous growth of selfishness, the source of every sort of evil. The offshoots of that loathsome weed are animosity, dissension, jealousy, quarrelling, envy, falsehood, dissembling, excess in eating and drinking, pride and so forth. These things — being a repellent to God's Holy Spirit, which is able to exert no influence on those who give way to them — are so many obstacles to the Kingdom of God, preventing it from taking shape amidst mankind.

The hearts of all people, in general, are infested with that horrid growth. However, we know that all throughout the Gospel Age — opened by the glorious message proclaimed by our beloved Saviour at the time of his earthly mission and constantly till today — some people have come to feel how wretched they were. Some still do today. They are not satisfied with the devilish influence pulling on their hearts. They have a predilection for real kindness and affection, which are lacking from that field of influence. They observe the absence of all rectitude and justice from the Adversary's

kingdom. They feel the ground is giving way beneath their feet when the ties which bind them to members of their families or to their friends, are broken either by departures or by death.

So, those people are in search of something permanent, something that will not disintegrate, because they hunger and thirst after real and lasting happiness. This being so, they can then come into the field of attraction of the Kingdom of God with the Almighty's kind assistance. He lets them feel his kindness through this ineffable invitation voiced by his dearly beloved Son, our Saviour: "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest."

In the long distant past already, the Lord sent prophets, of whom Abraham was. To Abraham, He promised: "In you and your seed, all the families of the Earth will be blessed." Others, Joseph and David for instance, had the experience of being forsaken by men. They took the Lord for their Shepherd, and the Lord watched over them and protected them. He let them feel his grace and kindness, and also lavished, on them, a magnificent portion of his blessing and of his treasures, which never pass away. It became possible to grant them these things because the Kingdom of God exerted a powerful pull on those prophets, and because, in the end, the principles of the Kingdom became exceedingly dear to their hearts.

David said: "I delight in your law," and: "The precepts of LORD are right and rejoice the heart." In magnificent bursts of enthusiasm, the prophets have displayed their joy in the Kingdom of God, and expressed the comfort it was to them. Isaiah, in particular, sang the Kingdom of God and its glorious hopes. He said: "It shall come to pass, in the last days, that the mountain of the LORD's house shall be established on the top of the mountains, and shall be exalted above the hills, and all the nations shall flow to it. And many people shall come and say: 'Come, let us go up to the mountain of the LORD, to the house of the God of Jacob. He shall teach us of his ways, so that we may walk in his paths,' ... They shall beat their swords into plowshares...and never again shall they learn war."

Those wonderful pictures give an idea of the peace that one day will come all over the world. Isaiah felt unutterable joy over being able to describe them and thus to give real hope to future generations. Later, when the Son of God came to Earth as an unprecedented drawing power of the Kingdom of God, all those prophecies became more living than ever before, far, far more than when they were uttered by the prophets themselves. The prophets gave very beautiful descriptions of the power of attraction of the Kingdom of God. As for the Saviour, he described the conditions for exerting that attraction that is to be felt like the pull of a magnet, drawing to it everything that is accessible to its influence, and he lived up to them himself.

The Lord Jesus delivered the message of divine grace with such power that, so to speak, he was an irresistible magnet. Therefore, when he delivered his first testimony on the shore of the Lake of Gennesaret, he immediately found three disciples who dropped their nets and followed him. Although they had duties to perform, they felt, in their hearts, that irresistible pull and were impelled to follow the Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world, and who is the central Core of the divine field of attraction.

What we find particularly admirable in our dear Saviour is the stand he adopted in his heart with regard to his disciples. He protected them and constantly encouraged them and vivified and sustained them with the beneficial influence of blessing he gave out. So that, after many trials, many difficulties and rectifications necessitated by the defects in their characters, the disciples responded to him with magnificent resonance of faith. When he asked them whether they also would go away, they answered out of the mouth of the Apostle Peter: "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life.'

In the days of our Lord Jesus, the Kingdom of God was illustrated as an intense beam of light, of joy and of felicity. The rich young man who wished to get into touch with the Kingdom of God, felt this. He asked the Lord Jesus: "What must I do...?" The Lord then pointed out to him the principles of the divine law. The youth answered that he was already doing those things, but he had a distinct feeling that there was something lacking. The Lord then put his finger on the sore spot, the one thing that was holding him back. He was relying on his wealth, but to get rid of it by distributing it to the poor, was a repellent to him. Such abnegation, such a big sacrifice, was something he could not contemplate, for the Adversary's selfish kingdom exerted too powerful a drawing power on the young man, and besides too powerful a power of repulsion towards God's ways. That is why we are told that he went away sorrowful, for he possessed great wealth.

Our beloved Saviour illustrated the kindness and the love that prevail in the Kingdom of God. For love's

The Sun: the star of life

From Swiss French newspaper *Tribune de Genève*, from the 8th and 9th of July 2023, we partly quote the following article written by Emmanuel Borloz, titled:

The Sun, an ordinary but wonderful star

This is the story of a small star, a simple yellow dwarf, located in the Orion Arm, one of the minor spiral arms of the Milky Way Galaxy. A star among the hundreds of billions of other stars in the galaxy, which itself is among the hundreds of billions of galaxies in the observable Universe, and which is a "nanocrumb" in the big picture, without which, we wouldn't exist.

"An ordinary star, but a miracle," says Frédéric Clette—a solar physicist [and astronomer] at the Royal Observatory of Belgium, where he manages SILSO, a world centre for sunspots— and the author of the French book Le Soleil et nous [a book about the Sun and us]. To find out everything about that ball of plasma with its molten core, which fascinates us so much, it's hard to find a better person to talk to. Follow the guide. ...

What powers our star?

The Sun runs on hydrogen. It burns approximately 600 million tonnes of it per second, in a physical process that is self-sustaining (through gravity) and that releases gigantic quantities of energy, and radiates the entire spectrum of radiation. In practical terms, stars are monstrous nuclear reactors. In their cores, fusion reactions take place: hydrogen nuclei fuse to form helium atoms. In the case of the Sun, this is a 15-million-degree boiler.

"The Sun represents 99% of the total mass of the Solar system. It's gigantic compared to our little planet, whose diameter is over 100 times smaller. And yet the Sun is a very average star. ...

What effect does the Sun have on Earth?

The Sun is directly or indirectly linked to almost all terrestrial weather phenomena. "And in many energy resources, except geothermal energy," continues Frédéric Clette, citing, in no particular order "wind power, hydroelectricity, tidal energy to a lesser extent, and even biomass in which the recovered energy is solar energy accumulated by plants in chemical form".

And what about climate change? This is the hot topic at the moment, says Frédéric Clette. "The Sun is variable. It goes through 11-year cycles of activity (magnetic-field intensity, sunspots, radiation, etc.). It has a minimum threshold of activity, below which it cannot go. Conversely, the maximum amplitude of solar activity is also unchanging. The Sun is in a very stable phase, its intensity varies by only a few percent per billion years. The rising trend of temperatures on Earth, which has been observed for several decades, disqualifies the Sun, and we have to look elsewhere for the culprit. If we look at the amplitude of activity cycles over the last 70 years, the trend is actually downwards. This is going in the opposite direction to temperatures on Earth."

He continues: "The last peak, in 2014, is the lowest in

a century. While in the past, there were indications that temperatures on Earth followed the solar cycle, there has been a decoupling in the last 150 years. The Sun's influence on the climate, which has always existed, is still present, but it is a minor fraction. The human factor has become dominant."

What is the Sun still hiding from us?

The Sun is revealing itself, but is still jealously guarding a number of mysteries that probes are trying to unravel.

"There are three big remaining puzzles," summarizes Frédéric Clette. "We still don't know what causes solar flares. The second concerns the Sun's cycles. We are beginning to understand that the Sun is a fantastic recycling factory for its own magnetic field. The Sun recovers and amplifies its magnetic field by transferring it from the surface to the poles. This circular dimension probably explains why the Sun's activity is periodic, with 11-year cycles, but we don't know any more than that. To unravel this mystery, we need to observe the Sun's poles, which has not been done yet. The last unknown concerns the solar wind, the stream of particles that bombards Space and that is responsible for the northern lights [the aurora borealis]. Little is known about this source."

The Sun is the star of our Solar System, which we follow on its path through Space. We are so used to seeing it, that we don't always think a lot about it. That is why it seems "ordinary" to us, to use the word expressed by Emmanuel Borloz, and for this reason, it is useful to remember, as he does, that we cannot exist without it.

And on that point, we become aware of what the Sun actually is. In fact, it is far enough away from the Earth, an average of 150 million kilometres, to not burn us and to not impede all life on Earth, but also close enough to give us the light and warmth that we need.

The temperature of the Sun's surface is 6,000 °C, the Sun's corona is over 1 million °C, and the Sun's centre is 15 million °C. The centre of the Sun is also where nuclear fusion takes place. The Sun has an average diameter of 1.4 million kilometres (109 times bigger than the Earth). It weighs 1.9891 x 10³⁰ kilograms (333,00 times the mass of the Earth). It consists of hydrogen (73%), helium (25%), oxygen, carbon, iron, neon, nitrogen, silicon, magnesium und sulfur. The Sun rotates about every 28 days (24 days at the equator, and 38 days at the poles). It travels around the Milky Way at a speed of 251 kilometres per second.

Scientists have naturally tried to determine the age of the Sun. They estimate it to be 4.5 billion years old. Frédéric Clette has also further reported about the origin of the Sun: "A cloud of rarified gas and dust orbits the disk of the Milky Way. Under the effect of rotation, matter is compressed and the cloud contracts. It reaches the famous threshold of 'gravitational instability', a tipping point. The cloud then collapses under the weight of its own gravity. The contraction and pressure increase, and temperatures rise. The central nuclear reactions begin, and the sphere of gas turns into a luminous ball. Our star is born."

Let's face it, we don't give too much credence to such a scenario. On the other hand, we are sure that the Sun — like all the celestial bodies in the Universe, and everything else in existence — was created. From this point of view, the Earth's distance from the Sun is no coincidence, and neither is its size nor are any of its physical characteristics. It is God Who willed it to be so, by virtue of the law that He established, that He Himself abides by and that is called the Universal Law, because it is found everywhere, from the infinitely small to the infinitely large. Thus, the Sun gives service to the Earth by giving it light and heat.

Scientists have also put a figure on the life expectancy of the Sun, estimating it to be about 10 billion years. Here too, it is appropriate to come to terms with God's sovereignty, and to say that not only did He create eve-

The following Sunday, he turns up, shy but smiling, and from then on is faithfully present at all the meetings and courageously engages in the fight against self.

One day, Alice receives a letter from head-quarters. Enclosed is a letter from the son of a subscriber to *The Monitor*. Feeling frustrated and disappointed in life, he has read some of the publications of the Lord's faithful Messenger, and has felt their beneficial influence. The thought has come to him that there, he might find some real friends, and so he has written to the head office of the Work. Alice goes to visit this young man who is expecting her. A friendly understanding is set up at once, and after they have been conversing

We admire the persevering work of scientists who seek to understand the world we live in, but we are assured that the key to understanding all this science lies with God, Who gives it to whom He will.

We are only at the beginning of knowledge, because before we know — as we have been known, as Apostle Paul says in 1 Corinthians 13: 12 — there are other steps to take, particularly that of obedience, submission to God. Let us not be like Eve, who wanted to know before obeying! We seen what the result of her error was.

In the next dispensation, which will soon be introduced on Earth, all people will learn to know and love the Lord God, thanks to the Sacrifice of his beloved Son, our dear Saviour, and of his faithful ones who followed him on the path of sacrifice. In that way, everyone will be able to reach their destiny: eternal life, on the restored Earth.

What does the future have in store for us?

In the "Letters from readers" section of the French newspaper *Ouest-France* on the 5th of December 2022, there was an article by Maëlle Prost, titled:

"Our planet might not have a future"

"I am an 18-year-old female student who participated in the Defence and Citizenship Day event [in France] on the 1st of December 2022. I was shocked by some of what our speakers had to say, both during their speeches and during the afternoon break...

Like many young people, I'm concerned about the future of our planet. There is nothing that I feel more strongly about, and I've already had the opportunity to 'march with signs' to defend this cause.

Firstly, for me to hear it said that there is no global warming caused by human activity, that commitment is pointless and that it's too late, sounds like an insult, not only to me, but to my whole generation, especially coming from someone who prides themself on teaching us about citizenship...

I'm sorry, but today's values are not the same as they were in the 20th century. We might not have experienced the world wars and all the wars of the last century, but today's adults have not experienced the constant anxiety of not having a future, no matter how hard we try to study and learn, because our planet might not have a future.

Today, whether we like it or not, taking responsibility for our environmental practices is a fundamental aspect of citizenship. I expect adults to show solidarity with young people, whose future is so uncertain, and not to laugh in our faces when we defend environmental causes."

That is a moving appeal from a young person who is sensitive to the environmental cause and who is seeking a better future! We greatly understand this young lady! It is true that many things have changed in our society, and we can feel, in her text, the difficulty that adults have in understanding young people.

To understand one's fellow person, one has to put oneself in their place. The future of the younger generation is indeed bleak. In addition to the spectre of unemployment, there are now the problems of climate change, pollution, deforestation, the disappearance of animal species, and so on. As Maëlle Prost says, we might well ask ourselves whether the Earth itself still has a future. At an age when one has the right to be carefree, our young people have concerns that their predecessors did not have, at least those who think and are sensitive to what is happening around them.

We are happy to respond to that concern, and to reassure all those who are worried about the future. In fact, the Earth will be restored as part of God's plan for humanity. We know that our planet was originally Paradise, with ideal climatic and environmental conditions, as described in the Book of Genesis, the first book in the Bible. The appearance of sin brought the curse, not only for our first parents and their descendants, but also for animals, plants and the entire planet.

God's will is that everything will be restored to perfection. It's a plan whose scope we find difficult to imagine, as so much wisdom is needed to restore everything without imposing anything on anyone, and without overstepping the threshold of invitation. It is with that spirit that the Lord issued this call: "Who is worthy to open the book and to break its seals?" (Revelation 5: 2). The Logos, the beloved Son of God, responded to that call with: "Behold, I have come to do your will, O God." Hebrews 10: 7.

We are struck by the conciseness of those words. Such a programme is set up with so few words. But what precision! If we were to analyze those two proposals, we would find a whole world of feelings. It is God's Spirit that communicates what we feel is missing from those words.

The Son of God came to Earth to become our Saviour, Jesus Christ. In three and a half years, he fulfilled a ministry of such magnitude that the Apostle John declares, at the end of his Gospel: "Jesus also did many other things. If they were all written down, I suppose that the whole world would not have enough room for the books that would be written" (John 21: 25). Our dear Saviour has also chosen, during the 2,000 years of the Gospel Age, the Little Flock, his faithful Church. It is made up of true priests who give their lives for their fellow people.

On his way home from school, the child decided not to take the usual route, but to take a shortcut through the fields to get to his home in the town of Ovada, near the city of Genoa [in northern Italy]. The little man bravely set about treading the snow,

which kept piling up. His school bag became heavier and heavier on his shoulders, and his steps shorter and shorter. Feeling exhausted, he finally let himself fall into a pile of snow.

He said later: "I wanted to get some sleep. I was so tired." He didn't know that if you fall asleep in the snow, you can definitely freeze to death.

Help came at the last moment. "Till", Gaspare's hunting dog, was waiting as usual for his young master to return home. When he didn't see him coming, he ran outside in the storm and found the child two kilometres from their house.

And this is what the child said: "I can still remember Till licking my face with his long warm tongue. Then, he started to trot a few steps. I had to follow him, but I was too weak for it. And my brave Till realized that straight away. He grabbed the collar of my coat, with his mouth and simply pulled me out of the pile of snow."

When Gaspare tried to get up, he fell back to the ground. But Till did not give up. He grabbed his young master again and dragged him for six hours through the deep snow, to their house. And when Gaspare was finally rescued, it was Till, the faithful dog, that collapsed.

We always like to read such touching stories, where animals, as creatures of God, show themselves capable of a devotion that confounds us.

The impressive behaviour of this dog shows that it has followed, in a moving way, the Universal Law of neighbourly love, which requires that we exist for the good of our neighbours. If animals are capable of such devotion, how much more should we humans, who have even greater possibilities, use them as an example to put an end to the growing misery on Earth!

That is not just a question of serious material difficulties, such as increasing famine, but also of much more serious dangers, such as the moral decay that results from material affluence if it is not balanced by corresponding gratefulness.

So, we see the vital importance of gratitude, which should correspond to the magnitude of the benefit received, in order to ensure balance, the indispensable equilibrium. This is precisely what leads to respect for life, and for the Source of life, which is God, the Almighty.

Where is artificial intelligence leading us?

The Swiss-French-language internet newspaper 20Minutes.ch, from the 30th of March 2023, provides interesting information about the development of artificial intelligence (AI). Its author, Laurent Favre, reports the following:

People demand an urgent pause in the development of AI

Technologies: In a petition, one thousand prominent personalities [tech leaders] point out the dangers linked to artificial intelligence.

The ability of ChatGPT—a conversation tool, managed by artificial intelligence (AI)—has come as a surprise. Technology specialists are concerned about the dangers that such high-performance systems could pose to humanity. A thousand people have signed an online open letter, calling for a pause, of at least six months, in the development of AI.

"Advanced AI could represent a profound change in the history of life on Earth, and should be planned for and managed with commensurate care and resources," the letter says. It continues: "Should we risk loss of control of our civilization? ... Powerful AI systems should be developed only once we are confident that their effects will be positive and their risks will be manageable."

Even Sam Altman, the CEO of OpenAI, which devel

Brother Jack undertakes to transport it with the assistance of a neighbour who has a car with plenty of room for it.

Now, the gas stove is in place. It works wonderfully. Once her voluntary assistants have gone, Alice thanks the Lord with all the ardour of her heart, for watching over his children with so much kindness and care. "How

faithful He is!" she thinks once more. In the middle of the night, she wakes up and thinks of her gas stove. She gets up to go and look at it, and contemplates: "No, it's not a dream! It's there, all right, and even more splendid than the one in the shop! How true are the words of our Lord when he says: 'Seek first the Kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you'!"

Later, when she is doing one of her rounds near the border of Luxembourg, Alice thinks she would like to evangelize in that country. She writes to the head office of the Work to ask for permission, and it is granted. There are three subscribers in that country, but no one to visit them. So, one Sunday, with Brother Jack, Alice sets out to make the acquaintance of these people. The journey is very pleasant, taking them through a forest of majestic trees. The day flies by, being filled with divine blessing. On the way back, Alice says: "We

should go back there to evangelize. Our dear Sister Josephine, who speaks German, could come with us, too."

The very next week, our three evangelists set out to carry out this plan. They have brought with them all the soiled German literature and several fresh copies.

Alice evangelizes on her own. Brother Jack and Sister Josephine go in another direction. Alice comes across some receptive hearts. When someone buys a booklet in German, she throws one of the soiled ones in with it. This is the favourable time for placing it. Soon, Alice is brimming over with joy. As she turns away from a door at which she has had no answer, she perceives her fellow workers coming to seek her. They have just met a policeman who told them that door-to-door canvassing is forbidden. Being intimidated, they decide to stop, but Alice thinks she will go on, and see what happens.

She tells them to go for a walk while they

oped ChatGPT, admitted that he is "a little bit scared" of the effects his creation could have if it were used for "large-scale disinformation" or "cyber-attacks". "Society needs time to adapt," he recently said to ABC News [USA].

Among the signatories of the open letter are well-known people in technology, such as Elon Musk and Steven Wozniak (from Apple), and academics and experts in the field, such as the CEO of Stability AI (an OpenAI competitor) and employees at DeepMind, an artificial intelligence laboratory at Google.

This is may well be a first in the history of technological development since the mid-19th century. In fact, we have always sought progress and contributed a great deal to it, often also with large amounts of money, but this time, it seems as though the situation has changed. Technology is in danger of outstripping our own capabilities, or rather, we might no longer be able to control our own inventions.

In its edition from the 3rd of May, 20Minutes.ch reports that Geoffrey Hinton has left Google so that he can freely talk about the dangers of AI. Furthermore, in the French newspaper Ouest-France, on the 1st of June 2023, we find a report, by Jean-Marc Bureau, arguing along the same lines:

Artificial intelligence: "Limit or ban research"

"In the newspaper Ouest-France, from the 21st and 22nd of May, [Ms] Laurence Devillers says nothing surprising as a researcher in artificial intelligence, except when she says: 'It's up to us to decide what we do with it.' She contradicts herself when she goes on to say that 'above all, we must not prohibit research'. Yes, there

are areas where we should limit or ban research.

History teaches us that a discovery, even a harmful one, always ends up being used one day. Secondly, as a private citizen, I have no power to influence political decisions on the use of artificial intelligence. The decision makers are the bosses of web giants. Unfortunately, governments have let them get away with it. Laurence Devillers clearly refers to the risk of 'The Sorcerer's Apprentice seizing discoveries to do business'. It's astonishing to see how much effort and funding, people put into making a substitute for their brains, when, with their own, they have a complete and effective tool."

That is also a very edifying and fair testimony. Indeed, however marvellous artificial intelligence may seem, we need to come back down to Earth and realize that it will not surpass the capabilities of the human brain, because a creation is not greater than its creator. If we firmly stick to that basic truth, then we won't be fooled by all the errors that people would have us believe. That applies to the computer and other discoveries which are, in reality, just what they are and nothing more, namely, machines, and they will never take the place of those who designed them.

However, the use that can be made of using artificial intelligence varies depending on the objectives of those who manipulate it. In the hands of the wrong people, it could cause real harm. The same was true of nuclear fission, which was used to make the atom bomb.

Human beings are endowed with brilliant intelligence. They have designed and developed countless technical achievements. However, it is very difficult for them to realize their true situation and that of the world

around them. To illustrate our point, we will quote the writer Arthur C. Clarke: "It may be that our role on this planet is not to worship God, but to create him." That speaks for itself, insofar as humankind do not create, they transform. To create means to produce something out of nothing, which humankind are incapable of doing. God creates, humankind transform. That is why the creation can never take the place of the Creator, any more than a machine can supplant a human. Any assertion to the contrary is a figment of the imagination of humankind who like to think that they will one day be able to develop a robot that can replace them. What could happen, however, is that technology harms or destroys humankind, given that all of these devices have not been developed with the primary aim of benefitting their users.

And therein lies the flaw in our whole system: it ignores the Universal Law, which requires every thing and every being to exist for the good of those around them. Humankind will have to learn to know this law and put it into practice if they want to survive on Earth, which will soon be restored, according to the plan that God Himself has for them, which is to restore all things to perfection. It was with the view to achieve this plan that God's beloved Son gave his life to pay the Ransom for humankind's sins, to satisfy justice. From now on, the precious merits of Christ are at the disposal of those who wish to begin a new life in which sin is combatted and must give way to virtue, which is love for one's neighbour, which assures peace, happiness and ultimately eternal life, for those who practise it.

To have true faith, we need the heart of a child, with a simple and trusting soul that completely puts itself into the Lord's hands. On the other hand, if we want to assert our personal wisdom, our so-called intelligence, it leads us to suspicions, doubts and quibbles, and to always see evil rather than good...

To do that, we need to have basic wisdom, to not mistrust our fellow person and to carefully watch over our own heart at all times.

Our dear Saviour was, in that way, wise for every trial. He constantly drew the strength he needed for his ministry in the prayers that he addressed to the Lord at all times, especially at night...

It is also terribly unwise to remain proud. We must rid ourselves, at all costs, of this dreadful poison, which does us awful harm and makes our fellow people suffer...

Wisdom furthermore means always existing for the good of our fellow person, in all ways. It also means letting our brother or sister shine, and keeping ourselves discreetly in the shadows...

Divine wisdom means being broad-minded, generous and full of affectionate and benevolent feelings, and being strict with oneself, but lenient with others. When we love someone tenderly, we easily pass over many things. We excuse easily. We don't find much to complain about, because love is big enough to fill in the gaps. We appreciate what others have done, even if it's a little flawed, and even if we could have done much better ourselves. Love bridges everything. It's the art of loving and being loved...

Divine wisdom also means never accusing anyone and never accepting accusations against anyone, and furthermore remaining on Mount Zion by shutting our eyes and ears, and putting our hands behind our back, in order to receive nothing against our fellow person...

The Lord tells us: 'Seek first the Kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well.' This is the wisdom of wisdoms. From then on, we can have ineffable experiences that wonderfully strengthen our faith...

It's about living for others and not for us. By thinking about others and taking an interest in them, we will rid ourselves of our own burdens. We forget our own burdens to help our fellow person unload theirs. Thus, our own burdens automatically detach from our back and fall away. The less we think about ourselves, the more the Lord thinks about us. He serves us much more wisely and usefully than we ourselves could. This is more divine wisdom."
